

Chapter Summary

The first chapter of Ruth serves to set the scene and present some of the key characters in this story. We learn of Elimelech's difficult decision to move his family away from their homeland due to a famine. Elimilech's untimely death, followed by the tragic deaths of both of his sons presents Naomi with a seemingly unsurmountable problem. Should she leave her home in Moab and return to Bethlehem? What about her two daughters-in-law? The love between these women is clear and their desire to remain with Naomi paints a picture of the behavior of a mother-in-law that we would do well to study and cultivate in our own families. Naomi was deeply loved by both Orpah and Ruth. All three of these women experienced widowhood and understood the pain, loneliness, and fear of widowhood. Both Ruth and Orpah hesitated to leave Naomi, but it appears that only one loved the Lord as well as Naomi.

One of the most well-known sections of this writing is found in verses sixteen and seventeen where Ruth makes a beautiful statement of devotion to her mother-in-law and claims Jehovah God as her God. The vow Ruth makes has often been included in marriage vows, however Ruth made this commitment, not to a husband, but to an in-law! Her love and respect for Naomi is clear, as is her sense of what is right. Naomi would be a widow lady, completely alone in the world if not for the love and devotion of this one young lady, the widow of her son.

Naomi's bitterness toward God appears to stem from her assumption that the Lord had done all of this to her, that He was against her, and that He desired her lonesome destitution. However, such was far from the case. Naomi's role and that of her daughter-in-law Ruth, is the heart of this account. Naomi, much like each of us, could not see the whole picture and did not know the whole story. She knew her own pain, loss, and loneliness intimately, but she could not see the beautiful plan her God was working.

The conclusion of this chapter leaves Naomi and Ruth home in Bethlehem during the time of the barley harvest. This time of year would be a time of hard work, social interaction, and the hope that often accompanies harvest time in agricultural societies.

❖ Ruth 4:1-2

- Boaz went right away to fulfill his promise to Ruth. This shows him to be a trustworthy and honorable man.
- "Go up to the Gate" was an idiomatic expression meaning "to go to court" as the
 city gate was a major gathering place for citizens. It was at the gate that official
 business was conducted.



- It is important to note that throughout this passage "close relative" is from the same Hebrew root word as "redeemer." The closest relative would have had the right not only to inherit the belongings of their deceased relative; they would have had the duty to take their wife as well. A duty that also included producing an heir for their relative if possible.
- The fact that these then men left what they were doing to follow Boaz reflects on his importance in the community.

❖ Ruth 4:3-8

- These verses are basically a legal transcript.
- Leviticus 25:25-30 outlines the legal responsibilities of the kinsmen redeemer.
- Numbers 27:9-11 discusses the order in which the line of kinsmen fell.
- The word for "sell" in verse 3 can also mean "hand over" which is likely what Naomi intended as this was the law outlined in Numbers 27:8-11.
- It is possible that by calling her "Ruth the Moabitess" that Boaz was counting on the closer kinsman not to want to marry a foreigner.

❖ Ruth 4:9-12

- The proceedings involved earning the right to redeem the land, not necessarily the redemption itself. Boaz would have still had to go to whoever currently held it and redeemed it.
- The response from all of those around is overwhelmingly positive
- Tamar and Judah→Genesis 38. Tamar was childless and upon the death of her husband, Judah married her and fathered Perez. They prayed for this blessing for Ruth.



❖ Ruth 4:13-22

- Notice the progression of Ruth throughout the book from foreigner (2:10) to maidservant (2:13) to maid 3:9 and now to wife (4:13).
- There is now a recognition that Naomi's life, that had once been emptied to the point of bitterness, was now full and blessed.
- While this descendant was a restorer of life for Naomi, this statement has a much fuller meaning looking ahead to the genealogy of this family. Through them comes King David and eventually Christ Himself.
- This birth would have been extremely significant to Ruth as well; after being married to Mahlon for 10 years and remaining barren, she finally has a child.
- It is significant to notice the bookends of this tiny book. We start with barrenness, famine, and death and now we see new life and blessing.
- The narrator doesn't view the climax as the resolution of the issues for the characters but with the birth of David.
- In the Hebrew text, Ruth was an epilogue to the book of Judges. This emphasizes the climax of finally finding the king after God's own heart. It also illustrates the same major theme as in Judges: faithfulness is rewarded.
- The idea of the kinsman redeemer acts as a shadow to the coming Messiah
 (cf. Isaiah 41:14, Luke 1:68)



5 Facts for Studying Judges:


1) Definition

Shofet/Shophet – The Hebrew word translated in English as "judge" has more of a meaning of military leader than one who presides over a case. The three primary roles of God's appointed judges were to: (1) Bring about conviction of sin (2) Help them through oppression (3) Help them remain faithful.



2) Timeline

- a) The period of the Judges lasted approximately 300-350 year. It covers the book of Judges through I Samuel 8:4-11
- b) The judges are not all written about chronologically. Sometimes they served simultaneously in different regions.





3) Location


- a) The land of Canaan. Inheritance given to Israelites in Joshua 21:43-45,
- b) Region where judges ruled.





4) History

- a) One generation removed from the faithful conquest of Joshua.
 - Jdg 2:7 And the people served the LORD all the days of Joshua, and all the days of the elders that outlived Joshua, who had seen all the great works of the LORD, that he did for Israel.
 - Jdg 2:10 And also all that generation were gathered unto their fathers: and there arose another generation after them, which knew not the LORD, nor yet the works which he had done for Israel.
- b) They did not fully conquer the inhabitants of the land leading to the cycle of apostasy. (Jdg. 1-2)





5) Key Verses

- a) "And the children of Israel did evil in the sight of the LORD, and served the Baals." 2:11, 3:7, 3:12, 4:1, 6:1, 8:33, 10:6, 13:1
