Since the church and the kingdom are one and the same (Matthew 16:18-19; Mark 9:1; Acts 1:3; 2:38, 47; 8:12; Colossians 1:13), and the church was established in the first century during the days of the Roman empire, it follows that the kingdom of God was established in the first century following the earthly ministry of Jesus. The church/kingdom is comprised of people from all nations (Isaiah 2:1-2) and thus consumes "all these kingdoms" (Daniel 2:44) and is spoken of in the New Testament as having been in existence during the first century A.D. (Colossians 1:13; 2 Thessalonians 1:5; Revelation 1:9). This kingdom still exists today, and all penitent sinners can choose to become a part of it by being immersed into Christ. 

Jesus' Death in Prophecy

Exodus 12:46 - It shall be eaten in one house; you shall not take any of the flesh outside the house, and you shall not break any of its bones.

- Psalm 34:20 He keeps all his bones; not one of them is broken.

<u>Fulfilled in: John 19:31-36</u> Since it was the day of Preparation, and so that the bodies would not remain on the cross on the Sabbath (for that Sabbath was a high day), the Jews asked Pilate that their legs might be broken and that they might be taken away. So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first, and of the other who had been crucified with him. But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs. But one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear, and at once there came out blood and water. He who saw it has borne witness —his testimony is true, and he knows that he is telling the truth—that you also may believe. For these things took place that the Scripture might be fulfilled: "Not one of his bones will be broken."

Leviticus 17:11 - For the life of the flesh is in the blood, and I have given it for you on the altar to make atonement for your souls, for it is the blood that makes atonement by the life.

<u>Fulfilled in: Matthew 26:28</u> For this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins.

Psalm 22:1 My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

<u>Fulfilled in: Matthew 27:46</u> And about the ninth hour Jesus cried out with a loud voice, saying, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

Psalm 22:7-8 All who see me mock me; they make mouths at me; they wag their heads; "He trusts in the Lord; let him deliver him; let him rescue him, for he delights in him!"

<u>Fulfilled in: Mark 15:29-32</u> And those who passed by derided him, wagging their heads and saying, "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself, and come down from the cross!" So also the chief priests with the scribes mocked him to one another, saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Christ, the King of Israel, come down now from the cross that we may see and believe." Those who were crucified with him also reviled him.

<u>Fulfilled in: John 19:28</u> After this, Jesus, knowing that all was now finished, said (to fulfill the Scripture), "I thirst."

Eight days later, his disciples were inside again, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were locked, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here, and see my hands; and put out your hand, and place it in my side. Do not disbelieve, but believe."

<u>Fulfilled in: Luke 22:35</u> And the people stood by, watching, but the rulers scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself, if he is the Christ of God, his Chosen One

<u>Fufilled in: John 19:23-24</u> When the soldiers had crucified Jesus, they took his garments and divided them into four parts, one part for each soldier; also his tunic. But the tunic was seamless, woven in one piece from top to bottom, so they said to one another, "Let us not tear it, but cast lots for it to see whose it shall be." This was to fulfill the Scripture which says, "They divided my garments among them, and for my clothing they cast lots." So the soldiers did these things

Isaiah 50:3-6 - I clothe the heavens with blackness and make sackcloth their covering." The Lord God has given me the tongue of those who are taught that I may know how to sustain with a word him who is weary. Morning by morning he awakens; he awakens my ear to hear as those who are taught. The Lord God has opened my ear, and I was not rebellious; I turned not backward. I gave my back to those who strike, and my cheeks to those who pull out the beard; I hid not my face from disgrace and spitting.

<u>Fulfilled in: Matthew 27:27-31</u> Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor's headquarters, and they gathered the whole battalion before him. And they stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, and twisting together a crown of thorns, they put it on his head and put a reed in his right hand. And kneeling before him, they mocked him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" And they spit on him and took the reed and struck him on the head. And when they had mocked him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him and led him away to crucify him.

Isaiah 53:3 He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief; and as one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not.

<u>Fulfilled in Matthew 26:37-38</u> And taking with him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, he began to be sorrowful and troubled. Then he said to them, "My soul is very sorrowful, even to death; remain here, and watch with me."

Isaiah 53:9 And they made his grave with the wicked and with a rich man in his death, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth.



<u>Fulfilled in: Matthew 27:57-60</u> When it was evening, there came a rich man from Arimathea, named Joseph, who also was a disciple of Jesus. He went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then Pilate ordered it to be given to him. And Joseph took the body and wrapped it in a clean linen shroud and laid it in his own new tomb, which he had cut in the rock. And he rolled a great stone to the entrance of the tomb and went away.

Isaiah 53:12 Therefore I will divide him a portion with the many, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong, because he poured out his soul to death and was numbered with the transgressors; yet he bore the sin of many, and makes intercession for the transgressors.

<u>Fulfilled in: Matthew 27:38</u> Then two robbers were crucified with him, one on the right and one on the left.

Zechariah 11:12-13 Then I said to them, "If it seems good to you, give me my wages; but if not, keep them." And they weighed out as my wages thirty pieces of silver. Then the Lord said to me, "Throw it to the potter"—the lordly price at which I was priced by them. So I took the thirty pieces of silver and threw them into the house of the Lord, to the potter

<u>Fulfilled in: Matthew 27:9-10</u> Then was fulfilled what had been spoken by the prophet Jeremiah, saying, "And they took the thirty pieces of silver, the price of him on whom a price had been set by some of the sons of Israel, and they gave them for the potter's field, as the Lord directed me."

The Crucifixion In Prophecy - TLC Lesson

Imagine with me for a moment that you were sitting in your house one evening, and you were granted a miraculous vision telling you that on a specific date you would be killed in a car accident. How would you respond? I'm pretty sure my reaction would be, "thanks for the warning! I'll be snuggled up on my couch with a good book all that day! & probably the day before and the day after too!" As a Christian I have no fear of death, in fact I find peace, hope and joy knowing that my eternity will be with my Savior. At the same time, truly I'm not in a huge hurry to get there either! I want time on earth with my husband. We have plans for the future that I want to be here for. I have 4 kiddos that bring me SO much joy. I want to finish raising my babies, & I want to experience being a grandma! I have it figured out, & if my husband lives to be 100, & I live to be 97, we can celebrate our 80th wedding anniversary! #lifegoals. I'm SUPER excited about that idea!

But let's change it up a little bit. What if you were sitting in your house one evening, & you were granted a miraculous vision telling you that on a specific date you would be killed in a car accident, and that if it DOES NOT HAPPEN your family will die instead.

This afternoon we are going to focus in on Matthew's account of the betrayal, trial and crucifixion of Jesus, and this is, on a VERY minor scale, the situation Jesus is in.

Matthew 26:1-2 - Right off the bat Matthew begins with Jesus himself prophesying about his crucifixion. The power in this prophecy is not in the amount of time that passes bw the prophecy and its fulfillment, but rather the knowledge that comes with this prophecy. Jesus knows that he only has 2 days left before he will be delivered to be crucified.

I want to encourage you to keep this in mind as we go throughout this study. Not only was each and every prophecy we will look at proof for the Jews, and for us, that Jesus was the Messiah, every single prophecy was also a reminder to Jesus of what he would suffer. Even more importantly, I want you to remember why Jesus intentionally chose to stay on the path he knew would only lead to the cross. Just as I'm sure each of us would gladly get in our cars knowing we would die in a wreck to save those that we love,



Jesus valued each of our souls more than his own life, and as we will see he went willingly to the cross for those that he loves, for us.

As we walk through Jesus' betrayal, arrest, trial and crucifixion we will see that every step was foretold by God. Before God laid the foundations of the earth, he had fully orchestrated his plan to reconcile us to him, and all of those plans came to fruition in the last days of Jesus' life (Romans 8:29).

Continuing on in Matthew 26:3-4 we see the Jewish leaders gather to plot against Jesus. Not just to arrest him. Not to discredit him. Their goal from the beginning was to kill him. They wanted him dead. They wanted him gone, which is a fulfillment of Psalm 2:2, "The kings of he earth set themselves, and the rulers take counsel together, against the Lord and against his Anointed."

Jumping down to 26:14-16 Judas is only too happy to give them their chance. And with blood money in his pocket, Judas joins Jesus and the other apostles for what we know will be the last Passover.

Beginning in verse 20 we read:

- Judas could not possibly have disgraced Jesus more, as sharing a meal, and in particular a dish together was a sign of loyalty and friendship.
- In John 13:18 Jesus specifically states that this meal with Judas was to fulfill the prophecy of Psalm 41:9, "Even my close friend in whom I trusted, who ate my bread, has lifted his heel against me.".

Verses 26-29

- Here Jesus is once again prophesying about what is coming. In instituting the Lord's Supper, Jesus is instituting His own memorial while at the same time trying to prepare his apostles for what is about to happen.
- By sacrificing his blood on the cross Jesus would not only be fulfilling the prophecies found in the OT, but in fact the Old Testament itself (Matthew 5:17, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfill them."



- How is he going to do that?
- **Leviticus 17:11** For the life of the flesh is in the blood, and I have given it for you on the altar to make atonement for your souls, for it is the blood that makes atonement by the life.

Ephesians 2:13 - But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ.

Jesus knows that his crucifixion is at hand. And he knows what is at stake for all of mankind if he does not follow through. And as we continue on in Matthew 26 Jesus leaves the safety of the upper room and goes with his apostles to the Garden for the beginning of the end, and ironically also the end of God's plan from the beginning.

Read with me Matthew 26:36-38

- I believe one of the most painful situations is when we reach out to someone when we are hurting, & they just don't hear us. Either they are distracted with their own lives, or they make assumptions about what we are trying to say, or what I think is the absolutely worst: they brush off our pain and struggle with platitudes. Please ladies, when someone is truly hurting, don't immediately try to force them to "look on the bright side." Sometimes people just need to know that their struggle, their pain, is OK. It's OK to not always be OK, that's what the church is for. Galatians 6:2 tells us to BEAR one another's burdens, not sugar coat them so they can put their happy church face back on.
- Here, Jesus needed his closest friends to help bear his burden, and if you continue on through verse 44 they not only once, but twice literally fell asleep in his hour of need. I can't imagine truly NEEDING my dearest friends or my husband, and having them fall asleep on me.
- Yet once again Jesus knew that this is exactly what would happen. Isaiah 53:3 foretold that Jesus would be a man of sorrows, who would be despised and not held in esteem.



- Not only was he preparing for extreme torture and death, he would go through it completely alone, and he knew it.

And then, in the midst of his hurt over his apostle's inability to support him in his pain, verse 46. Let's read verses 46-49. Here, we see Judas give Jesus the same greeting he gave in verse 25 when he calls Jesus, "Rabbi." Interestingly, one of the resources I was studying stated that we never once see Judas call Jesus 'Lord.' I haven't had a chance to verify that statement yet, However it is clear that in verse 25 Judas chose the title "Rabbi" even when all the other apostles called Jesus, "Lord," and Judas does the same here.

From here we know what happens: throughout the rest of chapter 26 Jesus is arrested, heals the high priest's servant after Peter cuts off his ear, and still they refuse to acknowledge who He is. He points out their blatant hypocrisy in coming to arrest him with weapons in the middle of the night, instead of publicly in the light of day as he taught, and in verse 56 we see another fulfillment of prophecy: Psalm 31:11 and Isaiah 53:3.

This is something else that I am afraid we often see even in the church: those who are causing trouble are pacified, while those who are obedient to Scripture are considered the "bad guys." For instance I am guessing we have all had interactions with someone whom it seems almost looks for something to be angry or offended about. How is this situation typically handled? We all walk on eggshells to keep that person happy.

What would happen if, instead, when they threw their inevitable fit we looked at them and pointed out that their attitude is sinful and they need to repent? They would hit the roof, drama would erupt, and most likely people would be upset with US for upsetting them. Instead of being upset with the people who CAUSE the trouble, in the American church we typically get upset with the people who CONFRONT the trouble. Sisters, that's exactly what happened to Jesus, it happens to ministers all over this country, and this should not be so! When someone (in love) takes a stand against a sinful



attitude or behavior, as those who bear the name of Christ we should SUPPORT them, even, & I would say especially if, it makes someone mad, because that takes a lot of courage, & it takes someone who truly is willing to be an ambassador for Christ.

In verses 57-62 Jesus is taken before Caiaphas the high priest in a complete farce of a trial. Scripture tells us plainly that they were seeking false witnesses against Jesus, meaning they knew he hadn't done anything they could rightfully condemn him for. Yet in verse 63 Jesus fulfills the prophecy made in Isaiah 53:7 and remained silent as the horrible barrage of false accusations continued.

Have you ever been in this situation? Where you know that Truth is on your side but if you speak up the consequences for others, in particular the Kingdom of God, would be dire? It's completely horrible! As a therapist it's interesting to me how there always seems to be a trend with my clients: I'll have many of my clients struggling with one particular thing, and then 6 months later many of my clients will be struggling with another particular issue. Over the last several months it's been the idea of vindication.

The great privilege of being a therapist is that you walk through people's darkest moments with them, with the goal of helping them heal and be mentally and emotionally stronger on the other side. Many of my clients have been through severe emotional traumas: as children their parents consistently said things to them that no child should ever hear, or due to their parent's own mental/emotional struggles as children they were given responsibilities and put into situations that they never should have been in. When we've been through horrible things, when we have been treated unfairly, it's human nature to long for vindication. We need people to acknowledge when we have been mistreated and done wrong. Yet in facing the greatest wrong ever committed by mankind, our Lord & Savior was silent as he was slapped, mocked and spit on.

Why was he silent? Because speaking up was in His best interest, but being silent was in OUR best interest. When we feel a need for vindication we need to ask ourselves, "Will vindication promote me, or the cause of Christ?" If we are speaking up for the cause of Christ we must be like Peter & John in Acts 4:19-20 and speak of what Jesus



has done for us. However there are situations where speaking up about personal wrongs that have been done to us can shatter an entire congregation or cause people to no longer trust the church. For instance I have known of ministers who were let go due to sinful or selfish agendas, or because as we mentioned earlier they confronted sin and it resulted in someone getting angry. These men could have chosen to make a public stink and fight for their job, risking splitting the Lord's body. Yet they chose to put what was best for the body of Christ above what was in their own self interest. Once again I'm speaking of a personal wrong, NOT a sin situation where someone is actually being injured. There are times it may be best for us to follow the example of our Savior and remain silent, putting the cause of Christ ahead of ourselves.

Continuing on in Matthew 26 this brings us to verses 69-75 and another fulfilled prophecy. Jesus had warned Peter what was about to happen, yet in his pride Peter did not truly consider what Jesus had said. I think oftentimes we are so much like Peter. "Sure, I know I'm not perfect, but I would never do anything REALLY bad." I can't tell you how many elders/ministers or their wives I know of who have been touched by adultery, divorce, prescription drug addiction, pornography addiction, teen pregnancy, or homosexuality in their families. The minute we decide we are not at risk or would NEVER do something, is the minute Satan has us exactly where He wants us.

How differently could this have gone if Peter had truly listened to Jesus' prophecy, & sought guidance? Sisters, when it comes to our souls, we simply can't afford to be prideful. Hebrews 12:1 tells us that even as Christians sin easily entangles us. We must heed the warning in Hebrews 12:1, and learn from Peter's mistake with Jesus, and be proactive in guarding our hearts, minds and actions, and that begins with being willing to admit that we are susceptible to sin so that the enemy will not catch us off guard as he did Peter. Take a minute and take stock: is there an area of your heart, an area of your life, that you have left open to attack? Do we have a heart issue where we believe we are above sin, and look down on those who we view as less than, or struggling more than ourselves?

Matthew 27 begins with the dawning of a new day, and Jesus being led away to Pilate. Once again the Jewish leaders are not simply



plotting to have Jesus imprisoned, their goal from the very beginning was to have Jesus murdered.

This fulfills the prophecy found in **Psalm 31:13** - For I hear the whispering of many— terror on every side!— as they scheme together against me, as they plot to take my life.

27:3-10 details the sorrowful, bitter end of the traitorous Judas. He returns the blood money he paid for Jesus, 30 pieces of silver. This amount is significant for 2 reasons: first of all, it demonstrates exactly what Jesus' life was worth to these people, because as we mentioned earlier this was the price for a slave. Exodus 21:32 tells us that if my bull rammed your slave and killed them, I owed you 30 shekels of silver. Jesus was sold for the price of a slave.

However even more importantly, this price fulfilled the prophecy found in Zecharaiah 11:12-13 Then I said to them, "If it seems good to you, give me my wages; but if not, keep them." And they weighed out as my wages thirty pieces of silver. Then the Lord said to me, "Throw it to the potter"—the lordly price at which I was priced by them. So I took the thirty pieces of silver and threw them into the house of the Lord, to the potter." Hundreds of years before Judas was even born God knew exactly what he would do, and how much he would be paid for it. With this prophecy I do want to specifically draw your attention to your notes, there is some confusion here because Matthew credits Jeremiah with this prophecy, yet it's found in the book of Zecharaiah. There is an excellent article by apologetics press that explains this, so I would really encourage you to take the time to read it.

Continuing on in verses 11-23 Jesus is before Pilate. Once again he refuses to argue and vindicate himself, he stays silent in the face of the false accusations leveled against him. Pilate is a perceptive man, and he has a read on this situation. He knows the Jews are only jealous of Jesus and he hasn't done anything wrong. His wife (whom it appears he respects and listens to) was given a dream by God and told Pilate to leave Jesus alone. Pilate tries everything short of openly defying the Jews to have Jesus released, however at this point the mob mentality has set in and nothing will appease the Jews until Jesus is dead.



Then in 24-26 Pilate symbolically washes his hands of Jesus, has him scourged, and delivers him over to be crucified.

And this is where it begins to get difficult to read. Verses 27-31 tell us of the complete contempt that was shown for our Savior: he was stripped, and given a scarlet robe to mock him. They mashed a crown of thorns onto his scalp and put a reed in his hand. Then they mocked him, spat on him, and beat him on the head with the reed from his own hand.

Yet as it was prophesied in Isaiah 50:6 Jesus took it. For you, and for me, he allowed every second of pain and humiliation to happen. Once they felt he was humiliated enough for the time being, or I suppose when they grew bored of mocking him, they led Jesus away to be crucified.

In the next 12 verses alone we see the fulfillment of 6 different prophecies. Read with me verses 32-34

- Verse 34 Psalm 69:21, "They gave me poison for food, and for my thirst they gave me sour wine to drink."
- Verse 35 Psalm 22:18, "They divide my garments among them, and for my clothing they cast lots.

Read verse 36

- Psalm 22:17, "I can count all my bones—they stare and gloat over me"

Read verses 37-38

- Verse 38: **Isaiah 53:12** Therefore I will divide him a portion with the many, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong, because he poured out his soul to death and was numbered with the transgressors; yet he bore the sin of many, and makes intercession for the transgressors.



Read Verses 39-42

- **Psalm 22:7-8** All who see me mock me; they make mouths at me; they wag their heads; "He trusts in the Lord; let him deliver him; let him rescue him, for he delights in him!"

Read Verses 43-44

Psalm 22:8, "He trusts in the Lord; let him deliver him; let him rescue him, for he delights in him!"

After hours of suffering and torment, Jesus' task on earth is almost fulfilled. Continuing in verses 45-46. This is a fulfillment of Psalm 22:1, "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?"

- This word "forsaken" literally means abandoned or left behind. We frequently talk about all of the physical pain Jesus went through on the cross, but I believe this is by far the worst he experienced. God cannot be in the presence of sin. So when Deuteronomy 21:23 was fulfilled, when Jesus was cursed and able to take on our sins because he was hanged on a tree, at that point God could no longer be in his presence. Jesus literally lost a significant part of himself, and was separated from God the Father for the first time in his existence. God is love. God is hope. God is peace. Just imagine what it would have been like for Jesus, at his weakest moment, and the greatest point of his suffering, to have that taken away, and to be completely separated from the presence of God.

Continuing on in verses 47-50.

- Once again a fulfillment of Psalm 69:21.

Read verses 51-54. The plan God laid before the foundation of the earth (Ephesians 1:4-5) was now complete. The Creator has now been killed by the Created.

Yet through his death Jesus continued to fulfill prophecies:

Read verses 57-60

- Isaiah 53:9, "And they made his grave with the wicked and with a rich man in his death, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth."



We have only looked at 2 chapters: Matthew 26 and 27. Yet in those 2 chapters we have seen 21 prophecies fulfilled in the death of Jesus. These events were prophesied not only in the Old Testament, but several of them by Jesus Himself. He knew exactly what was going to happen, how it was going to happen, and when it was going to happen. He knew who would be responsible, and that everyone would abandon him, and that God the Father himself would have to turn his back on him.

Can you imagine living with this kind of knowledge? Once again, the power of these prophecies is not just in their fulfillment and the evidence it gives us that Jesus was exactly who he claimed to be. The power is also in the fact that JESUS knew all of these things. Yet God chose to allow Jesus to suffer these things (John 3:16.) For those of you who are Mamas or aunties, can you imagine standing by & allowing these things to happen to your child when you know you could stop it?

And Jesus willingly walked into it. Every second he was being beaten and tortured. Every second he was on that cross, he was choosing. He didn't just choose us once, he chose us over, and over again in the darkest moments of his life.

We are the same way ladies. Being a Christian is not just a choice we make when we choose to be baptized. It's a choice that we must make over and over again every single day. Jesus chose us ladies, do we truly choose him?

2Ki 23:13 And the high places that *were* before Jerusalem, which *were* on the right hand of the mount of **corruption**, which Solomon the king of Israel had builded for Ashtoreth the abomination of the Zidonians, and for Chemosh the abomination of the Moabites,

and for Milcom the abomination of the children of Ammon, did the king defile.

Job 17:14

I have said to **corruption**, Thou *art* my father: to the worm, *Thou art* my mother, and my sister.

Isa 38:17 Behold, for peace I had great bitterness: but thou hast in love to my soul *delivered it* from the pit of **corruption**: for thou hast cast all my sins behind thy back.

Act 2:27

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Timeline of Events Leading Up to the Beginning of the Lord's Ehurch

Please understand that historians don't all agree on each date so some of these are approximate

- 967 B.C. → Assyrian Empire begins.
- 800 B.C. → Rise of the Greek City-States.
- 753 B.C. → City of Rome founded. Seven kings ruled Rome until it became a republic (244 years later).
- 750 B.C. → Homer writes the Odyssey.
- 722 B.C. Northern Tribe of Israel defeated by Assyria. Thousands deported by Sargon II. (Isaiah 20:1)
- 701 B.C.→ Sargon's son Sennacherib received tribute from King Hezekiah of Judah but after King

Hezekiah pleads with the Lord, 185,000 Assyrians are killed by an angel of the Lord. (2 Kings 18-19)

- 626 B.C. → Neo -Babylonian Empire begins.
- 609 B.C. → Assyrian Empire ends when Babylon and the Medo-Persians join forces to defeat it.
- 606 B.C. → First deportation from Judah by Nebuchadnezzar. Daniel is taken (2 Kings 24 & Daniel 1).
- In the second year of Nebuchadnezzar's reign, he had the dream of the statue which

by God's grace, Daniel was able to interpret the meaning of. It was about when the

Lord's Church would be established (Dan 2)!

- 586 B.C. → After two other defeats in 597 & 606, Judah is defeated by Nebuchadnezzar and Jerusalem destroyed (2 Chronicles 36:11-20).
- 550 B.C. → Archimedean / Persian Empire gets stronger.
- 539 B.C. → Babylon Empire (Belshazzar Daniel 5) defeated by the Medo-Persian Empire.
- 536 B.C. → First return to Israel (Zerubbabel & Jeshua are in this return).
- 522 B.C. Darius expands the empire, divides it by states that are each ruled by a satrap (governor).
- 509 B.C. ➤ The last king of Rome is overthrown, and Rome becomes a republic ruled by senators.
- 508 B.C. → Democracy begins in Athens.
- 480 B.C. > Xerses the First attacks the Greeks but is defeated at the Battle of Salamis.
- 477 B.C. → Delian League formed (Greek City-States uniting under Athens to fight Persia).
- 458 B.C. ➤ Second return of Jews to Israel (Ezra returns. Esther takes place between these two returns).
- 444 B.C. → Third return of Jews to Israel (Nehemiah is in this return).
- 355 B.C. ➤ Romans begin the conquest of Italy.
- 338 B.C. → Phillip of Macedonia begins conquest of Greece.
- 333 B.C. → Alexander the Great conquers the Persian Empire.



- 323 B.C. → Alexander the Great dies and the Greek Empire is divided among his four generals.
 - · Lysimachus who took Thrace and much of Asia Minor.
 - · Cassander controlled Macedonia and Greece.
 - Ptolemy I ruled Egypt, Palestine, Cilicia, Petra and Cyprus. He founded the Ptolemaic Dynasty which lasted until the death of Cleopatra VII in 30 BC.
 - · Built the Great Library at Alexandria.
 - Started the construction of the Lighthouse of Alexandria (One of the seven wonders of the ancient world).
 - Seleucus I Nicator ruled the remainder of Asia and founded the Seleucid Empire which was comprised of Mesopotamia, the Levant, Persia, and part of India.
 - Ptolemaic dynasty and Seleucid dynasty fought for control of Israel over the years and eventually went to the Seleucids.



- Antiochus Epiphanes conquered Jerusalem in 167 B.C. and erected an altar
 to Zeus in he temple and offered a pig on it. This began the Maccabean revolt
 which would eventually lead to the Jewish tradition of Hanukkah that is
 celebrated today.
- 146 B.C. ➤ Rome conquers Greece pulling it into their newly forming republic.
- 63 B.C. → Rome conquers Jerusalem and greatly reduces Jewish land holdings.
- 60-53 B.C. → First Roman Triumvirate (Julius Caesar, Pompey, and Marcus Licinius Crassus).
- 45 B.C. → Julius Caesar defeats Pompey and becomes Supreme Ruler (ending Roman Republic).
- 44 B.C. Julius Caesar murdered by Senate (best friend Mark Antony part of plot).
- 43-33 B.C. ➤ Second Triumvirate (Octavian (the future emperor Augustus), Mark Antony, and Lepidus).
- 37 B.C. Herod the Great begins to reign in Judah with the backing of Rome who is ultimately in charge.
- 27 B.C. → Roman Empire officially begins as Caesar Augustus (Octavian) becomes first Roman Emperor.
 - Luke 2:1 Caesar Augustus was emperor when Jesus was born.
- 14 B.C. ➤ Tiberius Caesar becomes Emperor of Rome.
- 4 B.C. > Herod the Great dies and this is also the possible date of the birth of Christ.
- 26-34 A.D. Crucifixion of Christ followed by the start of the Lord's Church 50 days later on the Day of Pentecost.
- 37 A.D. ➤ Tiberius Caesar dies.
